Route approx. 35 kilometres (22 miles) excluding detours, but shorter return routes are available. The route includes two W.W.II ex-USAAF airfields and several attractive villages.

SHOTESHAM

- Attractive long fenced common, ford and valley views.
- Thatched cottages and Georgian coach house. (15)
- · Greenwich Almshouses and Trinity Hall built to commemorate 16th century local birth of Henry Howard, Earl of Northampton. (16)

HAWES GREEN

- Old Hall, St Mary's Church and St Martin's Church ruins. (12)
- Valley viewpoint to north. (13)



· Darrow Wood, substantial motte and bailey castle earthworks constructed soon after the Norman conquest.




HARDWICK AIRFIELD (SHELTON) (9)

 Built 1941/2 and operated by 3000 personnel. Base from 1942-1945 for the 8th Air Force first B-24 Liberator Bomb Group, the 93rd. Sold by the RAF in 1962.

Hempnall Road

- Restored camp huts include a small museum and memorial erected by veterans of the 93rd Bomb Group. Open by appointment with the landowner (Tel: 01508 582263)

- Church of St Margaret and St Remigus at north end of village: flint with early Norman round tower (3)

SEETHING AIRFIELD (5)

- Built 1942/3 including a camp for 2900 personnnel. Home to USAAF 448th Bomb Group 1943 - 1945 which flew B24 Liberator Bombers. Sold by RAF in 1959
- Airfield now used by The Waveney Flying Group
- Restored USAAF control tower and memorial to the 448th. Bomb Group near airfield entrance. (Open first Sunday of months May-September, 10am – 5pm, free admission)

HEDENHAM

- Church of St Peter had first recorded rector in 1245 (6)
- "The Mermaid" pub's name was derived from the crest of the local land-owner; the Yarney family. See also attractive Hedenham Park and Hall (7)

Birth place of Horatio Nelson's mother, Catherine Suckling

- Scattered houses to south of Church Road were once situated near commons finally enclosed in 1843

TOPCROFT STREET

- · Pretty cottages and fine houses including 16th century Street.
- Farm, Topcroft Lodge and the moated Topcroft Hall
- · Farmshop on Hemphall Road
