## Horsham St Faith to Aylsham 20 mile cycle tour

In 1939-40 an RAF base was built at Horsham St. Faith. It became home to the Liberator aeroplanes of the 458th Bomber Group of the 2nd Air Division of the USAAF. The site

Mill Farm has a former corn mill that is visible through the gates. The now derelict tarred five-storey mill was built about 1880 for local farmer and dyer Joshua Harper and was one of the last to be built in Norfolk.

The 17th Century Heggatt Hall, set in beautiful parkland, amongst the trees. This was the home of the Warde family and there is an over mantel in the house that bears the arms of George Warde of Brooke,

1663.

Mill Pond of the old Horstead flour mill on the River Bure. The mill burned down in 1963 and has been left as a ruin although the 18th Century thatched Mill House barn can still be seen on the left just past the ruin.

Legend has it that once a year the ghost of Sir Thomas Boleyn passes over the bridge at Coltishall carrying the head of **Queen Anne Boleyn**, the doomed wife of King Henry VIII, who was born at **Blickling**.

The Old School House was built by the parish around 1720 to educate 10 poor children. Next to this is the site where in 1810 Roman urns and the foundations of a Roman settlement were found. The Coltishall Parish Church of St John the Baptist has a 15th Century tower but was largely rebuilt in 1865. The church is open all day for visitors.

Elizabethan Little Hautbois
Hall dated 1555 by William
Baspole which, in 1694 was
converted into a trust for the
poor of Peter Parmentergate in
Norwich. Today it forms part of
a local farm. Further on are
beautiful views over the rich
grazing marshes of the Bure
Valley and Buxton Mill.

Buxton Parish Church of St Andrew. The church dates from the 14th Century but was restored in 1881. It has good monuments, the remains of a 16th Century screen with

original colour and is open all day for visitors.

Aylsham's church of St Michael is believed to have been built by John of Gaunt when he was Lord of the Manor. There is a splendid 15th century font and the pulpit dates from 1637.
